## **Bentley** opposes any tax hikes

Governor also vows to reduce the size of government and see that state adheres to budgets

MONTGOMERY — Gov. Robert Bentley in his State of the State speech Tuesday vowed to chop the size of government, oppose tax increases and make sure the state lives within its means in budgets he soon will propose for next year.

'The process of cutting, reducing and saving taxpayers money will never stop as long as I'm governor," Bentley said in his speech to lawmakers, Cabinet members and others, delivered on the first day of thi year's regular session of the Leg-

"I will oppose any effort to raise taxes on Alabama families, and I will veto any tax increase,

Bentley said. Bentley vowed to propose legislation to consolidate some state agencies, but gave no de-

WASHINGTON — Three Monroeville Junior High School students were honored as part of the White House Science Fair on Tuesday, getting the opportunity to meet the president, explain their robotics work and even hand him a stuffed animal — using the long, remote-controlled arm of one of the robots they de-
